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Heather Stover District Special Education Supervisor








DISTRICT THERAPY DOGS

NEW READING SERIES FOR ELEMENTARY

At the start of the 2024-2024 school year, elementary students were introduced to a new reading series. Into Reading by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt is aligned to PA State Core Standards for English Language Arts and based on the Science of Reading. The Science of Reading is a way of teaching reading that is based on how our brains naturally learn to read. It focuses on helping children understand the sounds in words (called phonics), how letters represent those sounds, and how they are combined to create words.

Hero

The new series includes a wealth of online resources for both students and teachers, as well as a traditional reading book featuring everything from non-fiction to poetry. It also offers a variety of high-interest fictional stories aimed at engaging students. Teachers participated in summer in-service training to ensure they are fully prepared to use the new series with their students.



SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY & ENGINEERING, ENVIRONMENTAL LITERACY AND SUSTAINABILITY (STEELS) STANDARDS

The Pennsylvania State Board of Education adopted new academic standards for Science, Technology & Engineering, Environmental Literacy & Sustainability in January 2022. These standards are designed to help students become science, technology, environmental, and engineering literate. The new standards cover many of the same topics as the previous science standards but prioritize deeper understanding and scientific practices over memorization of facts. They also include a new domain for environmental literacy and sustainability. Forest Area students are beginning to explore the new standards through the implementation of lessons from <u>OpenSciEd.org</u> and Mystery Science. Many students are also excited to be participating in STEM classes focused on the exploration of these new standards. The implementation of the STEELS standards will lead to changes in state assessments as well. Notably, beginning this year, 4th grade students will no longer take the Science PSSA. This test has been moved to 5th grade. All Forest Area 5th graders will take the Science PSSA beginning this year.



STEPHEN HILL ASSEMBLY AND FOREST AREA RESILIENCY DAY



To kick off the school year, Forest Area students participated in an assembly featuring keynote speaker Stephen Hill. During his presentation, "Speak Sobriety," Stephen talked about his experiences with opioid addiction, recovery, and the importance of making good choices and being resilient. After the assembly, students participated in small group sessions with Stephen where they had the opportunity to ask questions as well as sessions about stress management, growth mindset, and student services that are available through the district.

FOREST AREA SCHOOL DISTRICT PARTNERS WITH MCCLURE COMPANY TO INSTALL SOLAR ENERGY SYSTEMS

In a move towards cost savings, sustainability, and educational innovation, the Forest Area School District has partnered with McClure Company to install advanced solar energy systems at both East Forest and West Forest schools. This initiative is designed to fully meet the district's electrical energy needs through clean, renewable power.

Amanda Hetrick, Superintendent of Forest Area School District, remarked, "Not only will this project significantly reduce our future energy costs, but it will also serve as an invaluable educational tool. The solar kiosks installed in each school will enable students to monitor the system's performance in real-time, making it a hands-on learning opportunity." At East Forest, solar panels will be mounted on the school's flat roof, with energy generation set to begin in fall 2024. Meanwhile, at West Forest, a solar field is being constructed in a secure, fenced enclosure, with

energy production anticipated in late 2024 or early 2025. Both solar arrays will be integrated into the existing electrical systems, effectively allowing the district to function as its own energy supplier. McClure Company will manage the installation and ongoing maintenance of the solar systems at no cost to the district. In return, the Forest Area School District has entered into a transferable Power Purchase Agreement (PPA), which includes a 30-year rate guarantee. This agreement is projected to save the district approximately \$600,000 over the lifetime of the project.
